CONVERSATIONS: Stimulating Discussion Across Time and Space. Public Outreach Programming for *How Medicine Became Modern*, taking place among sister institutions in the Cleveland metropolitan area.

A brief 15 minute presentation by Dittrick Public Engagement Fellow Brandy Schillace, followed by a dialog with an expert discussant. Questions are encouraged, and each session will conclude with a period of open public discussion. What laid the groundwork for anatomy instruction? How did we get from Sherlock to CSI? When did birth become “hospitalized”? What were the ramifications of the Comstock Acts (making birth control illegal in the US)? And, more importantly, how do these fascinating histories continue to change our world and shape our experiences? [individual lectures appear in *lectures and talks*]

EXCHANGES: The Global Center for Health Innovation and the Dittrick Medical History Center and Museum present a series of public forums on *then and now*.

Building on the success of Conversations, Exchanged will include a brief, TED-talk-style presentation by Brandy Schillace, approximately 15 minutes. The history of a key medical innovation, technology, or crisis will be delivered (“then”). This will be followed by a mini-panel where Dr. Schillace acts as host and moderator for either 1) a conversation with a single representative of the modern (“now”) among the Center’s Partners or 2) a moderation of a conversation among several representatives.

Approximately 15 minutes. A series of Round Tables will follow where the public engages over pre-printed questions regarding the then-now experience of medicine. The Global Center has a mission not only to reach that public, but to create relationships and build bridges. The mid-level engagement format:

- Provides the public with a voice
- Turns the public into “stakeholders”
- Humanizes the Global Center and creates a welcome atmosphere (and a “face”)
- Provides a narrative of then vs. now that allows greater understanding of today’s tech
